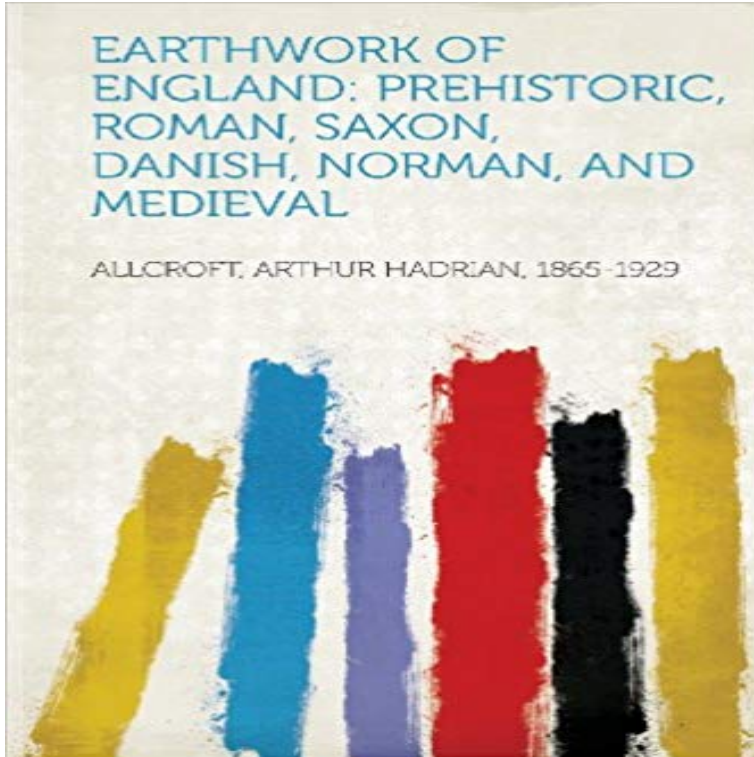


Earthwork of England: Prehistoric, Roman, Saxon, Danish, Norman, and Medieval
